## AN OFFICIAL TROOP VISIT EVENT

**RULES AND INFORMATION**

This unique event is open to uprising Webelos (current 3rd grade) and Arrow-of-Light Scouts (current 4th grade). We will be practicing the patrol method, cooking meals, visiting troops, touring the museum, playing games, participating in the OA campfire program - all while having fun with new and old friends! Due to the nature of the event, younger siblings of Webelos or AOLs are not allowed and highly discouraged, but exceptions may be reviewed for extenuating family circumstances.

Onsite check-in is Saturday, April 30th, from 7:30- 8:30 am, with the event opening flag ceremony and kickoff at 9:00 am. Event ends at 10:00 am Sunday, May 1st.

Completed BSA Medical Forms Parts A and B and activity consent form **MUST** be provided for EVERY attendee at this event; Scouts and Adults. Forms are to be turned in at the onsite check-in for the event.

Food for Saturday lunch, dinner and evening snack and Sunday breakfast will be provided. All Scouts are expected to help prepare and clean up as part of the patrol method. Please let event organizers know of any severe food allergies.

## CAMPING:

We highly encourage each Webelos and Arrow of Light Scouts to attend with one parent. This way adults will be able to visit/observe troops, ask questions and learn more about crossing over to Scouts BSA as well as the Scout.

If current Webelos and Arrow of Light Scouts choose to camp as a Den, they must provide one adult per four Scouts, but to maintain two-deep adult leadership; one of those adults must be a registered Scout leader. Camping will be in tents with no camping shelters or tents provided by the event organizers. Each Pack and/or Scout family is responsible for providing the necessary tents for their Scouts and Adults. All BSA Youth Protection rules must be followed at all times during this event. No adult may share a tent with the opposite sex unless he or she is that adult's spouse. No youth may share a tent with an adult or a person of the opposite sex other than a family member or guardian. Assigning youth members more than two years apart in age to sleep in the same tent should be avoided unless the youth are relatives.

Electricity is not available.

It is highly encouraged that Scouts tent with other Scouts and Adults tent separately, although this is not a requirement. Remember the purpose of this event is to give the Scouts a taste of being part of a Scouts BSA troop.

**Mount Le Conte and Cades Cove Order of the Arrow Chapters** will have a chapter store with some snacks, beverages and miscellaneous items for sale.

**RELIGIOUS SERVICE:** A Scout is Reverent. Chapel Service has been scheduled for Sunday morning at 9 am. All participants are encouraged to attend this optional service.

**PARKING:** Park in designated areas only. There will be no parking at the campsite. Be prepared to haul personal items from the parking area to our camping area.

**FIRST AID SERVICES:** There will be a medic on site. American Medical Response EMS and Park West Hospital has been notified of this event.

## ACCESSIBILITY AND SPECIAL NEEDS:

Camporee staff have no way to move the physically disabled around camp on a routine basis. While we invite and encourage you to join us, you must make arrangements to bring your own rough-terrain wheelchair or disability-specific Electric Powered Assisted Mobility Device (EPAMD) to this event if you need it. Even with such a device some areas may still be inaccessible. Charging of such devices may not be convenient to the camping area.

CPAP or other medically-necessary devices should be able to operate on a rechargeable energy source.

## OTHER RULES:

- Fixed blade/sheath knives are prohibited.
- Closed Toe shoes required by all participants at all times.
- Electronic devices use by youth is highly discouraged. Adults should limit the use of their phones/tablets in the presence of youth except to take pictures.
- The buddy system is to be used at all times.
- We will have a port-a-john near the campsite. Playing in and around the port-a-john is not allowed.
- **Pets are not allowed during the camporee.** Service animals area allowed with proper documentation.
- Disorderly conduct, the use of controlled substances, weapons or fireworks is prohibited and is grounds for immediate dismissal.

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## PACKING LIST

- Water bottle.
- ~~Mess Kit – Plate, bowl, fork, cup (inexpensive from the Dollar Tree will suffice)~~ We will be using disposable plates and utensils this year, and they will be provided for you.
- Snacks (no food in tents) or money for the OA trading post.
- Camping/folding chair
- Day Pack (such as school backpack or actual hiking daypack) It is highly encouraged that each scout carries a daypack with the 6 Cub Scout essentials in them.
- Appropriate clothes for the weather
- Field (Class A) Uniform for ceremonies
- Activity (Class B) Uniform (scout themed t-shirt) to wear during activities
- Rain Jacket / Windbreaker
- Jacket / Coat (as appropriate for weather)
- Fully enclosed shoes – no Crocs, etc
- Flashlight
- Lantern (optional)
- Tent(s) and ground tarp – suggested to bring separate tents such that Scouts can tent together and adults tent separately (suggested, not required)
- Sleeping bag, sleeping pad, and camping pillow
- **Completed BSA Medical Forms Parts A and B and BSA Activity Consent form for each attendee (both Scouts and adults)**
