Chiefly Speaking

“In 1942, Scout Executive Orton Duggan directed the establishment of an Order of the Arrow lodge in the Great Smoky Mountain Council. The first Ordeal took place on August 13 - 14 of that year at Camp Pellissippi. The newly inducted Order of the Arrow members that formed the new lodge at Camp Pellissippi were: John Brown, Henry Callaway, John Cox, Gordon Dean, Bob Duggan, Mont Egerton, Ted Glocker, Carl Murray, Larry Parry, Jim Schmid, and Tom Watts. In February 1943, the lodge received its charter, officially naming Pellissippi Lodge, the 230th Order of the Arrow lodge. The lodge’s first Brotherhood ceremony was performed later that summer.”

These are excerpts from *The History of Pellissippi Lodge #230*, and I share them with you to highlight the beginning of what has become such a major part of so many of our lives. Eleven Scouts took their first step in our order and ensured that others could follow in their footsteps.

We will celebrate the 80th anniversary of Pellissippi Lodge #230 this coming year. There will be many great events taking place throughout the year, so make sure you put the dates in your calendar now.

BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA SCOUTER CODE OF CONDUCT

On my honor, I promise to do my best to comply with this Boy Scouts of America Scouter Code of Conduct while serving in my capacity as an adult leader:

1. I have completed or will complete my registration with the Boy Scouts of America, answering all questions truthfully and honestly.
2. I will do my best to live up to the Scout Oath and Scout Law, obey all laws, and hold others in Scouting accountable to those standards. I will exercise sound judgment and demonstrate good leadership and use the Scouting program for its intended purpose consistent with the mission of the Boy Scouts of America.
3. I will make the protection of youth a personal priority. I will complete and remain current with Youth Protection training requirements. I will be familiar with and follow:
 - BSA Youth Protection policies and guidelines, including mandatory reporting: www.scouting.org/training/youth-protection/
 - *The Guide to Safe Scouting*: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss
 - The Sweet Sixteen of BSA Safety: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss/sweet16
4. When transporting youth, I will obey all laws, comply with Youth Protection guidelines, and follow safe driving practices.
5. I will respect and abide by the Rules and Regulations of the Boy Scouts of America, BSA policies, and BSA-provided training, including but not limited to those relating to:
 - Unauthorized fundraising activities
 - Advocacy on social and political issues, including prohibited use of the BSA uniform and brand
 - Bullying, hazing, harassment, and unlawful discrimination of any kind
6. I will not discuss or engage in any form of sexual conduct while engaged in Scouting activities. I will refer youth with questions regarding these topics to talk to their parents or spiritual advisor.
7. I confirm that I have fully disclosed and will disclose in the future any of the following:
 - Any criminal suspicion, charges, or convictions of a crime or offense involving abuse, violence, sexual misconduct, or any misconduct involving minors or juveniles
 - Any investigation or court order involving domestic violence, child abuse, or similar matter
 - Any criminal charges or convictions for offenses involving controlled substances, driving while intoxicated, firearms, or dangerous weapons
8. I will not possess, distribute, transport, consume, or use any of the following items prohibited by law or in violation of any Scouting rules, regulations, and policies:
 - Alcoholic beverages or controlled substances, including marijuana
 - Concealed or unconcealed firearms, fireworks, or explosives
 - Pornography or materials containing words or images inconsistent with Scouting values
9. If I am taking prescription medications with the potential of impairing my functioning or judgment, I will not engage in activities that would put youth at risk, including driving or operating equipment.
10. I will take steps to prevent or report any violation of this code of conduct by others in connection with Scouting activities.



Scouts and their parents expect all Boy Scouts of America activities to be conducted safely. To ensure the safety of participants, the Boy Scouts of America expects leaders to use the four points of **SAFE** when delivering the Scouting program.

SUPERVISION

Youth are supervised by qualified and trustworthy adults who set the example for safety.

- Accepting responsibility for the well-being and safety of youth under their care.
- Ensuring that adults are adequately trained, experienced, and skilled to lead the activity, including the ability to prevent and respond to likely problems and potential emergencies.
- Knowing and delivering the program of the Boy Scouts of America with integrity.
- Using qualified instructors, guides, or safety personnel as needed to provide additional guidance.
- Maintaining engagement with participants during activities to ensure compliance with established rules and procedures.

ASSESSMENT

Activities are assessed for risks during planning. Leaders have reviewed applicable program guidance or standards and have verified the activity is not prohibited. Risk avoidance or mitigation is incorporated into the activity.

- Predetermining what guidance and standards are typically applied to the activity, including those specific to the Boy Scouts of America program.
- Planning for safe travel to and from the activity site.
- Validating the activity is age-appropriate for the Boy Scouts of America program level.
- Determining whether the unit has sufficient training, resources, and experience to meet the identified standards and, if not, modifying the activity accordingly.
- Developing contingency plans for changes in weather and environment and arranging for communication with participants, parents, and emergency services.

FITNESS AND SKILL

Participants' Annual Health and Medical Records are reviewed, and leaders have confirmed that prerequisite fitness and skill levels exist for participants to take part safely.

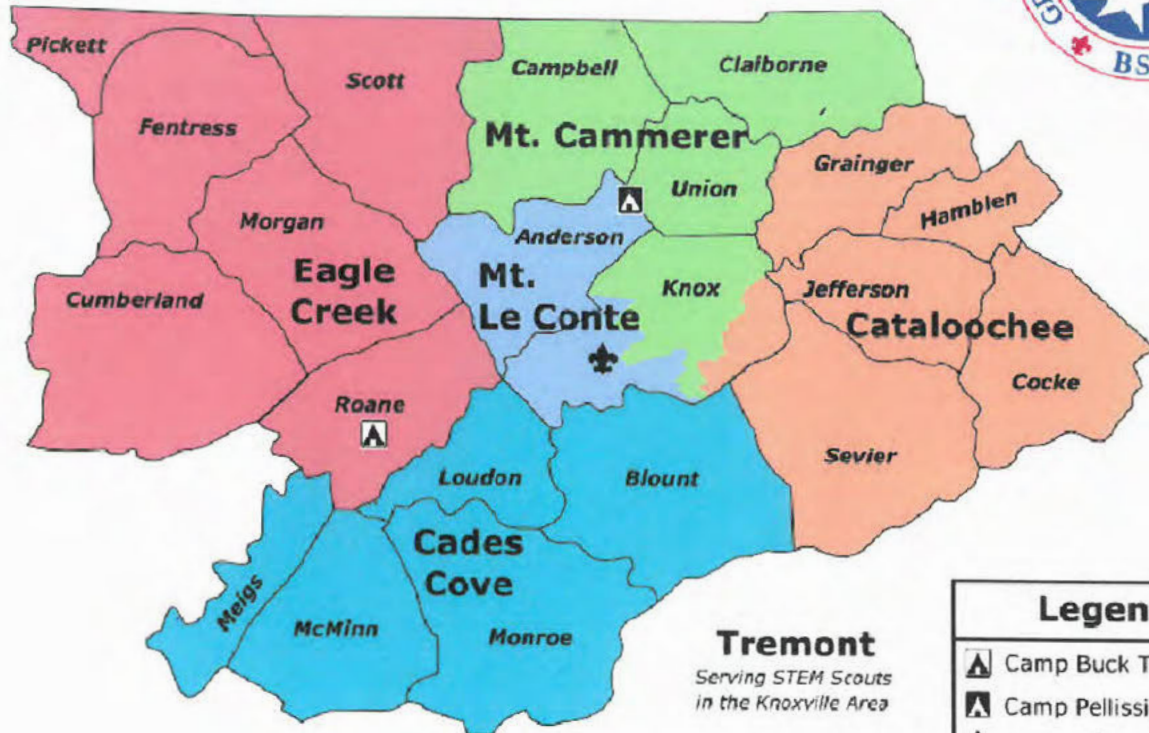
- Confirming the activity is right for the age, maturity, and physical abilities of participants.
- Considering as risk factors temporary or chronic health conditions of participants.
- Validating minimum skill requirements identified during planning and ensuring participants stay within the limits of their abilities.
- Providing training to participants with limited skills and assessing their skills before they attempt more advanced skills.

EQUIPMENT AND ENVIRONMENT

Safe and appropriately sized equipment, courses, camps, campsites, trails, or playing fields are used properly. Leaders periodically check gear use and the environment for changing conditions that could affect safety.

- Confirming participants' clothing is appropriate for expected temperatures, sun exposure, weather events, and terrain.
- Providing equipment that is appropriately sized for participants, is in good repair, and is used properly.
- Ensuring personal and group safety equipment is available, properly fitted, and used consistently and in accordance with training.
- Reviewing the activity area for suitability during planning and immediately before use, and monitoring the area during the activity through supervision.
- Adjusting the activity for changing conditions or ending it if safety cannot be maintained.

The History of Pellissippi Lodge #230

In 1942, Scout Executive Orton L. Duggan directed Assistant Scout Executive and Camp Pellissippi Camp Director Elmer Hawkins to establish an Order of the Arrow lodge in the Great Smoky Mountain Council. Hawkins was familiar with the Order of the Arrow, having started the lodge in Johnson City, Sequoyah Lodge #184. For that purpose, in the summer of 1942, Hawkins culled from Camp Pellissippi's senior staff, the first group of candidates for membership in the new lodge. At the last meal of the summer camp week, Hawkins told the candidates the story of Uncas and Chingachgook and the legend of the Order of the Arrow. Then he gave each candidate a three-inch piece of hollow bamboo tube (with one internode intact) with a half-inch piece of paper inscribed with the letters WWW rolled up inside the tube. After the tap-out was conducted to select the final candidates, it was announced that the Ordeal would take place later in the summer on August 13-14 of that year.

The first Ordeal, a special encampment held at Camp Pellissippi, lasted for two days. When the candidates arrived, they were led to the lake and taken via boat to the outpost camp near Loyston Point. They were instructed to observe complete silence throughout the entire two-day Ordeal weekend. Some brought food rations, which were quickly confiscated. For their Ordeal service project, the candidates made lean-tos and various types of camp furniture from the brush and dead but standing chestnut trees that still abutted Camp Pellissippi in the early 1940s. After completing their service projects, the candidates meditated on their experiences. Not much is known about the first lodge Ordeal except for what some of the charter members recall. Charter member Carl Murray from Maryville recalled his Ordeal experience: "We were exhausted, and the Indian in charge of us let us rest for about an hour before we were taken back to the outpost. Once we arrived back at the outpost, standing before us, were a group of Indians. It was quite impressive." Henry Callaway, also from Troop 88 in Maryville, described two unique things that he remembered. "We were each told to expose our chest by unbuttoning our shirts and had water poured on us to symbolize that we were clean and pure of all selfishness and evil, and then we each had to chew on a root-stock that symbolized the increase in strength and vigor to be used in the service of others."

The Ordeal Ritual itself was also held at the outpost camp. Hawkins had arranged for the ceremony team from Sequoyah Lodge #184 to come and perform the induction ceremony that evening. Accompanying the ceremony team was their Scout Executive and Supreme Chief of the Fire, Mr. Dudley Unkefur. The ritual team members from Johnson City included John Miller, and Luke Kesterson, both charter members of Sequoyah Lodge #184. The newly inducted Order of the Arrow members that formed the new lodge at Camp Pellissippi were: John Brown, Henry Callaway, John Cox, Gordon Dean, Bob Duggan, Mont Egerton, Ted Glocker, Carl Murray, Larry Parry, Jim Schmid, and Tom Watts. After the Ceremony, each new member was given the Tokens of the Ordeal: an arrow band or sash, and a membership pin suspended from white and red cloth. Each ritual team member and new OA member also received a half- red, half- blue neckerchief with a silver edge on it. The neckerchief is considered to be the first piece of Pellissippi Lodge memorabilia issued. Later that year, the charter members of the Order of the Arrow, along with Elmer Hawkins, were recognized at the Great Smoky Mountain Council's annual Court of Honor, held at the S&W Cafeteria in downtown Knoxville.

Later in 1942, after the induction weekend was completed and membership established, Pellissippi Lodge, on behalf of Elmer Hawkins, applied for a charter from the National Office of the BSA, which assigned the lodge

number 230, which was given based on the number of lodges active at the time. In February 1943, the lodge received its charter, officially naming Pellissippi Lodge, the 230th Order of the Arrow lodge. The name of the lodge was chosen due to its formation occurring at Camp Pellissippi. It's meaning in the Cherokee language as well as the historical significance of the name throughout the region. The silver fox was chosen as the totem; no one knows why. The next summer, new members were tapped out and inducted weekly at the camp.

In the summer of 1943, Pellissippi Lodge's first Brotherhood ceremony was performed, during which Scout troops, rather than camp staff, chose new members for induction. Once again, the Sequoyah Lodge ceremony team came from Camp Unaka to perform the ceremony. At its conclusion, the new Brotherhood members were given a special silver-filled membership pin with an arrow on one end and a chain connecting it to a silver fox totem. These were used for only a few summers to signify membership until cloth patches were issued, beginning in the early 1950s.

In the fall of 1949, the Region V Encampment for Explorers and Scouts was held at Cades Cove in the Great Smoky Mountains. The event served as an opportunity for Scouts to gather at the regional level. This event hosted the first Vigil tap-out. OA members called out from the Region V were Elmer Hawkins of Johnson City, TN, Arthur B. Wood of Knoxville, TN, and Jack Fisher of Knoxville, TN. Hawkins and Fisher were honored for their scouting service as professionals; Wood for his volunteerism. It was announced that the new Vigil Honor candidates would complete the Vigil at the Region V Area Conference in the spring of 1950 at Camp Pellissippi. Their recognition was significant because these men became the first members from a Deep South lodge to complete the Ordeal, Brotherhood, and be called out for the Vigil Honor from a lodge that was started in the South.

On the Area and Section level, Pellissippi Lodge has hosted the Area/ Section Conclave a staggering twelve times in 1950, 1953, 1957, 1959, 1963, 1969, 1975, 1982, 1990, 1996, 2007 and 2015. Additionally, of those conclaves hosted by Pellissippi Lodge, the lodge was given the honor of hosting both the 75th and 100th Anniversary Order of the Arrow Conclaves. Pellissippi Lodge has also seen many of its youth leaders go on to serve as Area/ Section Chiefs over the years. These members include James Montgomery, Warren Boop, Buddy Allison, Mike Pelton, David Barker, Bo Croley, Ed Jennings, Patrick O'Shea, Cliff Harmon, Tom Ballard, David Clary, Wade Hembree, Jeff Moser, H. Doug Ferguson III, and Taylor Clark.

Since the founding of Pellissippi Lodge, an honor society that started as a way to recognize scouting's honored campers has grown into a full functioning organization that has become a vital part of the Great Smoky Mountain Council's Boy Scout program. More importantly, the lodge itself has set a precedent of service to not only the council and its camps, but also to the Order of the Arrow as a national organization. In its seventy-five year history, Pellissippi Lodge has hosted the National Order of the Arrow Conference on four different occasions each time at the University of Tennessee- Knoxville in 1977, 1992, 2000, and 2022. Moreover, because of the lodge's success on both the Section and National levels, the lodge has seen four of its members serve as National Officers including three who served as National Chief of the Order of the Arrow. These members included James Montgomery in 1952, Clifford Harmon in 1973, and Jeff Moser in 1988. Additionally, H. Doug Ferguson III was elected to serve as the last Southeast Region Chief in 1992 before the Region reorganization in 1993. The lodge has also seen more of its leaders recognized by the National Order of the Arrow Committee by awarding them the OA Distinguished Service Award. Those members from Pellissippi Lodge #230 awarded this honor are: Arthur Wood, Cliff Harmon, Tommy Nelson, Doc Rooney, Jeff Moser, and Mikkie Goins.

Today, Pellissippi Lodge #230 serves as a vital partner to the growth of the Scouting program in the Great Smoky Mountain Council and continues its legacy of recognizing those who hold high the ideals of Scouting, a legacy it is incredibly proud of and seeks to continue for the distant future.

Pellissippi Lodge Awards

Each year at the annual Lodge Winter Banquet, the lodge hands out specific awards to recognize the achievements and service that Arrowmen have done in the prior year.

A description of the specific awards is provided below. Any member of the lodge may be nominated for any award, which will then be voted on by the Awards Committee. The results of the awards will be announced and awarded at the Lodge Winter Banquet.

The Jim Montgomery Service Award is presented to an Arrowman (a youth under the age of 21) who goes above and beyond his duty to promote cheerful service in the Lodge, Council, District, Chapter, and/or Troop. Named in honor of past Pellissippi Lodge, Area and National Chief - Jim Montgomery.

The Jeff Moser Rising Arrowman Award is presented to an Arrowman (a youth under the age of 21) who is relatively new to the Chapter and Lodge yet has stepped up to significantly help his Chapter and Lodge. Named in honor of past Pellissippi Lodge, Section, and National Chief, Founder's Award Recipient, and Distinguished Service Award Recipient - Jeff Moser

The Cliff Harmon Inductions Award is presented to an Arrowman (a youth under the age of 21) who promotes the inductions process from unit elections to brotherhood ceremony. Named in honor of past Pellissippi, Section, and National Chief, and Distinguished Service Award Recipient - Cliff Harmon

The H. Doug Ferguson, III Ceremonies Award is presented to an Arrowman (a youth under the age of 21) who knows the ceremonies and is very active with ceremonies activities at Ordeals and Fellowships. Named in honor of past Pellissippi Section, Region Chief, and Founder's Award Recipient - H. Doug Ferguson, III.

The J.T. White Native American Award is presented to an Arrowman (a youth under the age of 21) who exemplified Native American traditions with drumming, dancing, singing, ceremonies, etc. Named in honor of Pellissippi Lodge Founder's Award Recipient, Vigil Honor Member, and Adviser to many - J.T. White.

The Arthur B. Wood Adviser Award is presented to an Adviser (an adult over 21 years of age) in the Lodge who exemplifies being a youth adviser. Named in honor of past Pellissippi Lodge Longtime Lodge Adviser and Pellissippi Lodge's 1st Distinguished Service Award Recipient - Arthur B. Wood.

The Chapter Spirit Award is presented to one Arrowman from each chapter who demonstrates the spirit of the Order of the Arrow in their chapter.

Special Awards Recipients of Pellissippi Lodge #230

The Founders Award

Introduced at the 1981 National Order of the Arrow Conference, the Founder's Award recognizes Arrowmen who have given outstanding service to their lodge. The award is reserved for an Arrowman who demonstrates that he or she personifies the spirit of selfless service, as advocated by founder E. Urner Goodman and co-founder Carroll A. Edson. Lodges may petition the national Order of the Arrow committee to present between two and four awards annually, depending on the number of members in the lodge. PELLISSIPPI LODGE BY-LAWS

ORDER OF THE ARROW

Article I: Name, Affiliation and Mission

1. Mission. The mission of this lodge is to fulfill the purpose of the Order of the Arrow as an integral part of the Boy Scouts of America through positive youth leadership under the guidance of selected capable adults.
2. The lodge shall be known as: Pellissippi Lodge, Great Smoky Mountain Council No. 557, Boy Scouts of America, and shall be under the supervision of the Council Camping Committee and the administrative authority of the Scout Executive.

Article II: Officers and Duties

1. The Lodge will be governed by the National Order of the Arrow policy, by the Lodge Rules, and by the elected officers of the Lodge.
2. The officers of this lodge shall be lodge chief, two lodge vice chiefs, lodge secretary, and lodge treasurer. These elected officers must be younger than 21 during their entire term of office.
3. The duties of these officers shall be outlined in the separate "Lodge Officers Responsibilities" document.
4. The Lodge shall have at least two advisers, with one being a volunteer and one being a professional Scouter, both appointed by the Scout Executive, and any number of associate advisers as desired. All associate advisers to be appointed by the Lodge Adviser and approved by the Scout Executive.

Article III: Nominations of Lodge Officers

1. The Lodge Officers shall be elected annually at the Fall Fellowship unless the Lodge Executive Committee votes otherwise with a majority.
 - 1.1. The terms of both the Lodge and Chapter officers shall be one year. The term shall begin on January 1st, and end on December 31st.
 - 1.2. Lodge officers may only serve two terms consecutively in the same office.
 - 1.3. A term is defined as more than six months.



2. Nominations for Lodge offices shall be made on official nomination sheets obtainable from the Lodge Secretary, which contains all of the specifications and rules required for officer eligibility.
 - 2.1. These specifications and rules are determined and amended by the Lodge Executive Committee.
 - 2.2. Any changes or amendments must be communicated to the general assembly within one week of changes being approved.
 - 2.3. There will be no floor nominations accepted.
 - 2.4. Each candidate must submit their completed nomination form to the Lodge Chief and Lodge Adviser at the date and time indicated on the nomination form.
 - 2.5. Each candidate must have the approval and the verification of the Lodge Adviser and the Scout Executive before they may run for office.
3. A candidate nominated for any office and not elected to that office may only drop down to run for another office if they applied for that office on their nomination sheet.
4. The votes shall be counted by the Teller Committee.
 - 4.1. This committee shall consist of five adults and five youth members of the Lodge.
 - 4.2. These vote counters shall be selected by the Lodge Chief and Lodge Adviser.
 - 4.3. The Lodge Chief shall appoint two poll watchers to observe actual voting.
5. No Arrowman serving as a Section, Region, or National officer may hold a Lodge office without resigning from their lodge office prior to the beginning of their term.
 - 5.1. Resignation from the Lodge office must be received in the Council office no later than 30 days following the election of the aforementioned office.
 - 5.2. If the officer does not resign, the office will be declared vacant and the successor will be appointed by the Lodge Chief.
6. No Arrowman serving as an officer with an entity representing an older youth program (e.g., an officer in the Council, National Service Territory, or National Venturing & Sea Scout Officers Association, or Quarterdeck) may hold a Lodge office without resigning from their lodge office prior to the beginning of their term.
 - 6.1. Resignation from the Lodge office must be received in the Council office no later than 30 days following the election of the aforementioned office.
 - 6.2. If the officer does not resign, their office will be declared vacant, and the successor will be appointed by the Lodge Chief.
7. No Arrowman serving as a lodge officer may concurrently serve as a chapter officer.

Article IV: The Election of Lodge Officers

1. After all Candidates are verified as qualified, balloting shall be taken for each office separately in the order following: Lodge Chief, Lodge Vice Chief of Administration, Lodge Vice Chief of Program, Lodge Secretary, and Lodge Treasurer.
2. The Lodge Chief, or designee appointed by the Chief, shall preside over the limits of debate and voting.
3. Each chapter will receive one ballot for each member present up to the maximum amount of 10. These ballots can be cast for any candidate, and split among multiple candidates if desired.



4. For electing the Lodge Chief, Lodge Vice Chief of Administration, Lodge Vice Chief of Program, Secretary and Treasurer with a run-off election, after votes are counted, the candidate receiving the least number of votes will be removed from the ballot. This system of elimination will continue until such time as there is one remaining candidate.
5. In the event of a 50%-50% tie, the presiding chief holds the tie-breaking vote.
 - 5.1. If the presiding Chief is running for another position or re-election, the vote falls to the Vice Chief of Administration, and if they are running, the vote continues down the officer team.
 - 5.2. Should every officer run, each chapter with at least 1 member in attendance will receive 1 vote, and each member of the officer team who is present gets one vote.
6. In the event of the resignation of the Lodge Chief, the Lodge Executive Committee shall meet and elect the successor within 30 days of receiving the formal resignation.
7. The Lodge Vice Chief of Administration shall serve as the interim Lodge Chief until the special election may take place.
8. Any Lodge officer position not filled will be appointed by the Lodge Chief who will be taking office January 1st.

Article V: The Chapters

1. The Pellissippi Lodge shall be divided into one Chapter for each Council district. These Chapters shall be under the direct authority of the Lodge and bound by the Lodge rules and the National policy.
2. If the Chapter fails to function, the Lodge Chief may take any action, within national policy, to reactivate the Chapter.
 - 2.1. This includes, but is not limited to appointing a chapter officer or officers as necessary should there be no acting officers in those positions. These appointments should be assisted by the advisement of the Lodge Adviser.
 - 2.2. The Lodge Chief is empowered to remove any Chapter officer who fails in their responsibility to the Chapter.
3. Each Chapter shall be responsible for Unit Elections and callouts in their own Districts with the assistance of the Lodge Unit Elections Chairman. Elections and callouts shall be carried out as prescribed in the current printing of the Order of the Arrow Handbook and The Guide for Officers and Advisers.
4. The Chapter shall also be responsible for summer camp promotion in their own District.

Article VI: Administration on a Chapter Level

1. The Chapters will each have their own separate officers. These will be Chapter Chief, Chapter Vice Chief, and Chapter Secretary.
 - 1.1. Chapter officers shall be nominated and elected by the youth members of the Chapter.
 - 1.2. The duties of these officers are outlined in the "Chapter Officer Responsibility" document.
2. Each Chapter will have a Chapter Adviser who is appointed by the District Executive in consultation with the District Committee Chair and Lodge Adviser and approved by the Scout Executive.



3. If more than one Chapter Vice Chief is desired and needed for the operation of the Chapter, the Chapter may elect as many as two Vice Chiefs.
 - 3.1. Approval of this election must come from the Lodge Chief with the Chapter having to supply good reasons for the extra officer.
 - 3.2. Any other variation in numbers of officers or officer positions must also be approved by the Lodge Chief.
4. Chapters may produce T-shirts, but any other memorabilia must be approved by the Lodge Chief and Lodge Adviser.

Article VII: The Lodge Executive Committee and Executive Board

1. The lodge executive committee (LEC) shall be composed of the elected lodge officers, immediate past lodge chief, lodge operating committee chairmen, lodge adviser, one member of the council camping or program committee if appointed by the Scout Executive, chapter chiefs, chapter advisers, Scout executive, and lodge staff adviser.
 - 1.1. The LEC shall handle all the business of the Lodge on the major decisions that will affect the entire Lodge. This committee shall meet at least three times per year.
 - 1.2. Dates of Lodge Executive Committee meetings shall be set by the Lodge Chief unless the Scout Executive or their representative feels that an emergency meeting is necessary. These emergency meetings must take place no sooner than seven days after the meeting notices are sent out.
2. The following members shall constitute the Loge Executive Board; the current Lodge Officers, the current Chapter Chiefs of active chapters or their designees, and past Lodge Chiefs under the age of 21.
 - 2.1. The Lodge Executive Board will vote on all Lodge business.
 - 2.2. A quorum shall consist of 50% of all Lodge Executive Board members. Past Lodge Chief's do not count in determining a quorum.

Article VIII: Business of the Lodge

1. The Pellissippi Lodge may have as many Ordeals as needed to induct the candidates from that year's Unit Election process, while not having any less than two Ordeals.
2. The Lodge shall have at least four main functions per year. These will include two Ordeals and a Spring and Fall Fellowship. The dates for these functions shall be set at least six months in advance and may only be canceled with the approval of the Lodge Chief and Scout Executive

Article IX: Lodge Committees

1. The Lodge Chief shall appoint the Chairman of each operating committee with an adviser chosen by the Lodge Chief and the Lodge adviser.
 - 1.1. The standing operating committees shall be: Unit Elections, Camping Promotions, The Silver Fox, Finance, AIA, Vigil Honor, Awards and Recognition, and Memorabilia.



- 1.2. The Lodge Chief may appoint any additional committees that he feels necessary.
2. All memorabilia and patch designs must be submitted to and approved by the Lodge Memorabilia Committee; the Lodge Chief will have final approval of any insignia design.
3. The Awards and Recognitions Committee is made up of the Chairman, the lodge officers, and other members chosen by the Lodge Chief.
 - 3.1. The standard Lodge Awards will be voted on and decided by the Lodge Executive Committee.
 - 3.2. The Founder's Award is voted on by the Founders Committee with nominations open to the entire lodge.
 - 3.3. The deadline for nominations and voting date for awards will be determined by the Awards and Recognitions Committee.

Article X: Membership in the Lodge

1. The requirements for membership in this lodge are as stated in the current printing of the Order of the Arrow Handbook and the Order of the Arrow Guide for Officers and Advisers.
2. Elections shall be operated as stated in Article V, Paragraph 3
3. The procedure for the Ordeal shall be as stated in the current printing of the Order of the Arrow Handbook and the Guide to Inductions
4. Completion of Brotherhood membership shall be in accordance with the requirements in the current printing of the Order of the Arrow handbook and the Order of the Arrow Guide for Officers and Advisers.
 - 4.1. Opportunities to achieve Brotherhood membership shall typically be available for all eligible members at both fellowships.
 - 4.2. The Lodge Chief shall have the authority to decide other opportunities for Brotherhood to be given.
5. Attainment of the Vigil Honor shall be in accordance with the requirements in the current printing of the Order of the Arrow handbook and the Order of the Arrow Guide for Officers and Advisers. The Vigil Honor will typically be given at either the Spring or Fall Fellowship, with the Lodge chief making the final decision between one of the two.

Article XI: Lodge Finances

1. The Lodge dues shall be decided yearly by the LEC.
2. The Lodge dues shall be collected through the Lodge Treasurer for deposit within the Council Scout Office.
3. All Order of the Arrow funds shall be handled through the council service center and go through all normal council accounting procedures.
4. On October 1 of each year, the Lodge shall mail or email a bill or statement to each member informing them that their dues will expire on December 31 of the current year.



5. The Lodge dues must be paid by March 1st or the unpaid member's name shall be deemed inactive.
6. Lodge dues cannot be paid for more than two years at one time.
7. The Lodge shall pay the registration fee of the Lodge Chief for all National events.
8. Debts incurred by the Chapters must be approved by the Key Three and the Lodge Executive Board beforehand.

Article XII: The Silver Fox

1. The Silver Fox shall be the official publication of the Lodge.
2. This publication shall be published whenever the Lodge Chief deems it necessary. The Chairman, or the editor, shall set the deadlines for members to submit articles.

Article XIII: Amendments to the Rules

1. Amendments must be approved by the Executive Committee and then presented to the Lodge for acceptance. The Lodge must pass it with a 2/3-majority vote of the youth members present.
2. The Lodge By-Laws may not be suspended without the approval of the Chief, the Executive Committee, and a 2/3 vote of the youth members of the Lodge.
